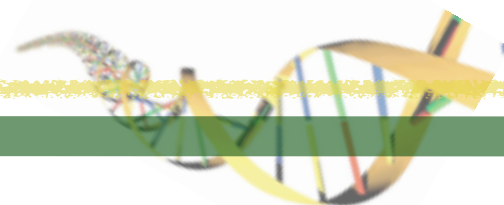

About the IHV Global Clinical Programs

The Institute of Human virology was established in 1996 as a partnership between the State of Maryland, the City of Baltimore, the University System of Maryland and the University of Maryland Medical System with a mission to push the frontiers of science and care delivery by accelerating the time between discovery of interventions and actual delivery to needful patients. Though established with an initial focus on virus related infections and cancers, the institute has since grown to address infectious and other non communicable diseases of global significance.

By virtue of a deep relationship with the medicine and infectious disease departments of the University of Maryland School of Medicine and the University Medical Center, the Clinical Division of the Institute has over the last few years expanded the Institute's global foot print by providing clinical care, medical education, institutional strengthening and research programs and services in low and middle income countries.

These activities have positively affected hundreds of thousands of patients all over the world and strengthened medical education and delivery systems across Africa and the Caribbean.

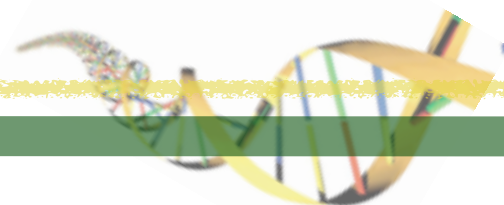
Our value proposition

The founding principle of the institute is very clear. Science must serve humanity and the faster proven, novel breakthroughs are made available to patients at the bedside, the better for all. By combining the disciplines of basic science research, epidemiology and clinical research with actual clinical care, the institute is able to accelerate and enhance the impact of science.

The clinical division of the institute has taken this value proposition further by making such breakthroughs in care and treatment not just available to patient populations within research settings or the local Baltimore area alone, but to millions of patients all over the world through a global network of scientists, medical personnel and professional staff that deliver effective interventions to the people most in need.

The divisions' work and its global team of outstanding individuals have markedly enhanced the University of Maryland's global presence and made the Institute one of the prime implementers of USG global health programs in Africa and the Caribbean.

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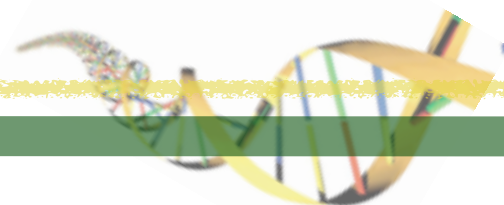
Our core advantage

Our core advantage is our people. The racially and ethnically diverse group of scientists, physicians, nurses, community specialists, laboratory scientists, information specialists, epidemiologists and various management, administration and support staff located across 10 countries.

These are the people who with a strong grasp of cutting edge science (both trial and implementation based), and a deep knowledge of local contexts, have brought about the growth of the global programs portfolio that has received almost 200 million USD in grant funding over the past 9 years. Today this team continues to implement the global program with an annual average of 25 to 30 million USD in grant funding.

These committed men and women are the beating heart of the global program and the reason for its continued success and growth.

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IHV GCP in global care and treatment

For the last 9 years, IHV GCP has been a global leader in the provision of care and treatment to people living with HIV AIDS. As technical partners in the AIDSRelief project, IHV worked with consortium partners to provide care and treatment to over 500,000 patients and as of last year, about 10% of all patients receiving treatment under PEPFAR were receiving it in an AIDSRelief supported clinic.

The IHV GCP contribution under PEPFAR has not been significant in numbers alone but also in quality. IHV affiliated programs continuously recorded some of the best treatment success rates and lowest lost to follow up rates in almost all the countries worked in.

IHV has worked with numerous ministries of health in the development, adaptation and updating of national guidelines, has been part of the collaborative effort towards the development of national databases and electronic medical record systems, and has trained thousands of health care workers in the provision of quality HIV related services.

Today, IHV continues to work with many indigenous partners to transfer the necessary skills and competencies that will allow local organizations continue to provide quality technical assistance to care providing sites with a focus on the sustained achievement of quality outcomes in patient care.


IHV GCP in Global Medical Education

Many low and middle income countries do not possess an adequate pool of well trained health workers capable of providing site level care, national and regional health services leadership, and expert guidance regarding HIV and Infectious diseases.

IHV GCP is training and developing physicians in infectious diseases and HIV medicine through post graduate training programs in Guyana, Haiti, Kenya, Rwanda and Zambia. Some of these important programs are producing the first set of locally trained ID experts in these countries.

IHV GCP is working with universities in Guyana, Kenya and Rwanda to revise pre service medical training curricula and support the ministry of health in maintaining adequate training to health workers through mentorship programs designed to keep workers updated on HIV and ID interventions relevant within the contexts they work in.

In Zambia and Kenya, IHV is supporting the NIH to develop research capacity amongst physicians especially in the areas of implementation science which will support the rapid deployment of operational research findings into care and treatment services. IHV GCP is also working with leading teaching hospitals to establish departments of Infectious disease.



IHV GCP in Global Institutional Strengthening

IHV GCP is supporting the health care system of the countries it works in through targeted institutional strengthening activities for various national players such as ministries of health, major training institutions, indigenous organizations and other locally relevant implementing partners.

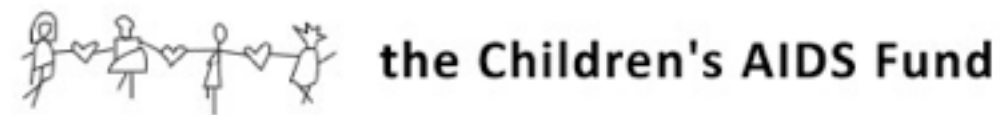
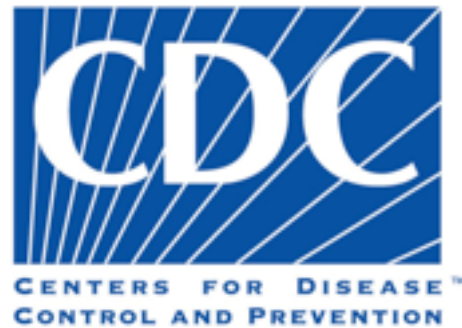
Since 2005, IHV has received physicians and nurses from all over the world for participation in the highly regarded International Physicians Exchange program. This clinical training program immerses students in practice oriented, advanced HIV training and due to the high value perception of the program, IHV has through this mechanism trained national leaders in HIV care and physicians from some of the largest care providing facilities in the countries worked in.

IHV has supported Ministries of health to develop mentorship frame works for supporting health workers, and supported accreditation programs with the development of mechanisms and content for continuous medical education.

IHV continues to play a major advisory role in the development of national and international frameworks and targets for health programs, and is part of the major technical working groups overseeing various aspects of ID related programs in supported countries.

Key events and achievements in 2012

Collaboration with the Dept. of Medicine, University of Nairobi, March 2012

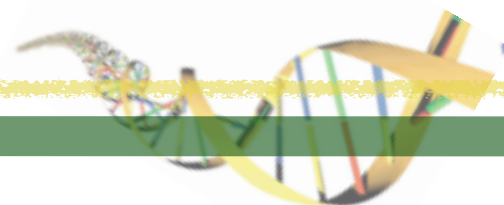
Dr. Redfield hosted Prof Amayo, Prof Lule and Dr. Mecha from the UoN department of medicine in a bid to expand the collaboration between Maryland and Nairobi in the area of post graduate medical education. The well attended meeting ended with a plan to establish an infectious disease division in the UoN department of Medicine and for UMB to provide training and experiential learning opportunities to UoN faculty.

AIDSRelief ends in 8 countries, April 2012

After 8 years of stellar work that brought much needed care and treatment to over half a million patients, the AIDSRelief program came to an end in 8 of the nine focus countries. AIDSRelief was continued for another year in Kenya.

Hosting of University of Nigeria faculty, April 2012

A team of four faculty members from the University of Nigeria, Nsukka visited UMB to seek areas of mutual collaboration between the 2 campuses. IHV personnel participated in hosting these visitors.

Keynote speech at inaugural PACE HIV symposium, University of Nairobi, June 2012

19th International AIDS Conference, Washington DC, July 2012

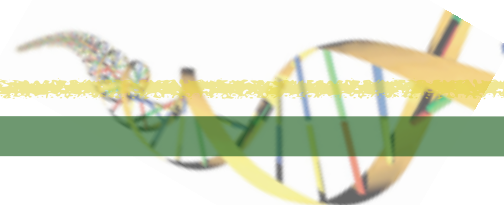

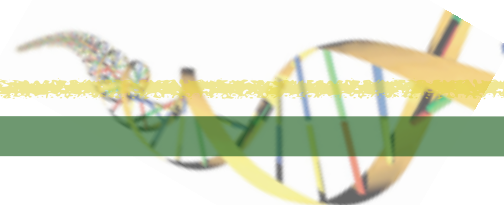
Key events and achievements in 2012

Closure of the Uganda program, September 2012

After 8 years of service to the Ugandan people as part of the PEPFAR funded Track 1 AIDSRelief program, the program in Uganda came to an end. All the previously managed sites were effectively transitioned to local partners who also assimilated most of the program's country staff. We will always be proud of our accomplishments in the country during this time and eternally grateful to the wonderful people that made these accomplishments possible.

University of Maryland Entrepreneur of the year award, October 2012

The 2012 entrepreneur of the year award was given to Dr. Redfield and Dr. Blattner; the 2 Associate Directors of the IHV, for the great strides both men had made in expanding programs that treat HIV and related infectious diseases all over the world. Through the AIDSRelief program implemented across 2 countries in the Caribbean and 7 countries in Africa, and the ACTION program implemented in Nigeria, both men served as Principal Investigators over grants that brought in more than 400 million USD to the University of Maryland and served over 700,000 patients world wide. They were jointly honored with this award in recognition of their achievements at the annual UMB gala night in October 2012.

IHV International meeting, October 2012

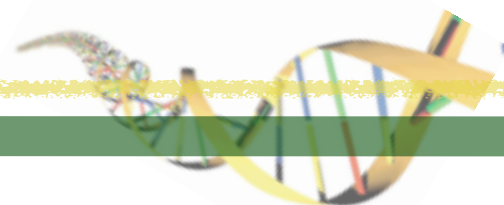
The 14th annual IHV international meeting was held in Baltimore and participants from all over the world gathered to share and examine innovative, scientific breakthroughs in HIV/AIDS biology. Members of the Global Clinical programs from Haiti, Uganda, Nigeria and Zambia gave presentations during the week long conference.

UMB leadership visit to country programs, December 2012

Professor Richard N Pierson M.D., Senior Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Interim Director of Research Affairs paid a visit to the Global Clinical country programs in Kenya and Rwanda. This visit gave this high ranking official of the university first hand experience of the work carried out by the global program in these countries.

Support for indigenous partner organizations

Increasingly, the United States Government is directly funding local indigenous organizations in host countries to provide care and treatment for HIV patients. This is in a bid to accelerate country ownership and enhance local capacity. In this regard the GCP provided support to the establishment of indigenous organizations in Kenya and Nigeria and both organizations were able to receive funding in the last year to provide care and medical education services.

A grant in partnership with USAID and the African Medical and Research Foundation tasked with improving the health of populations within the northern arid region of Kenya.

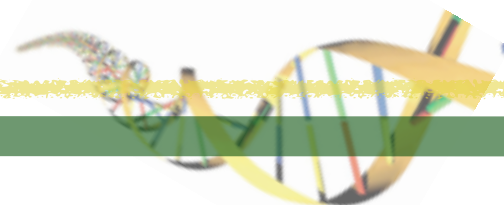

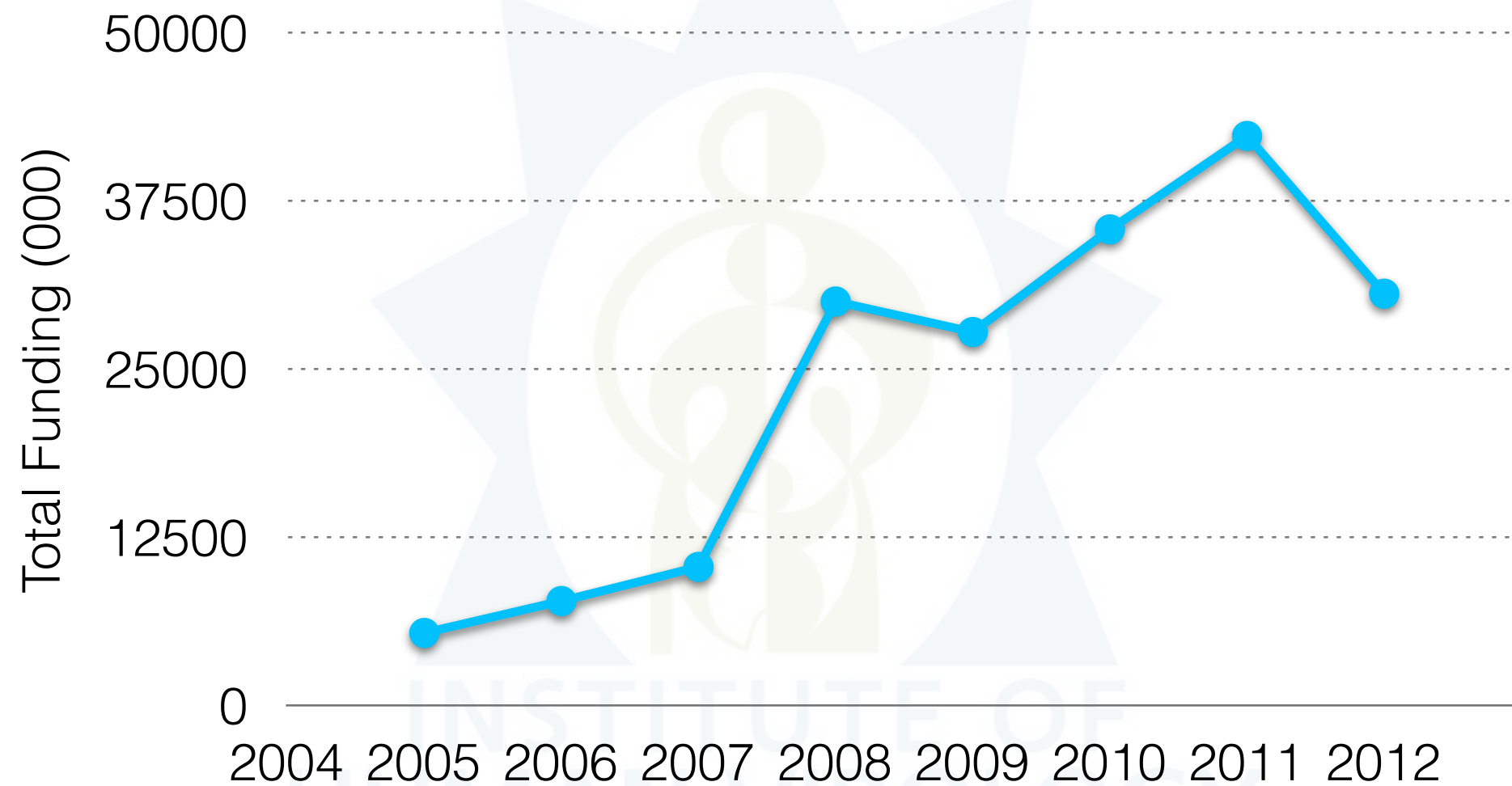

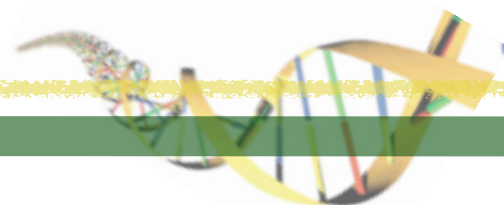
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Funding trend

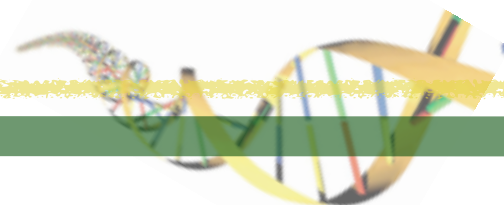

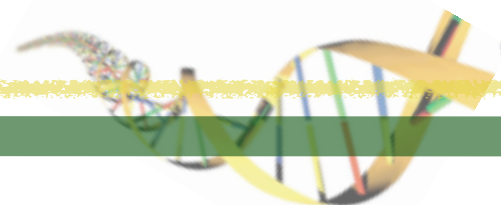

Country profile - Nigeria

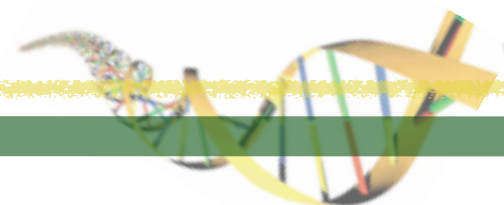

Country profile - Rwanda

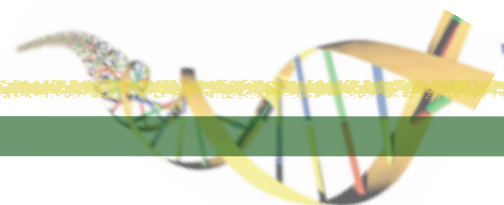

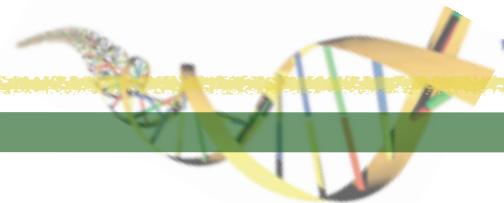

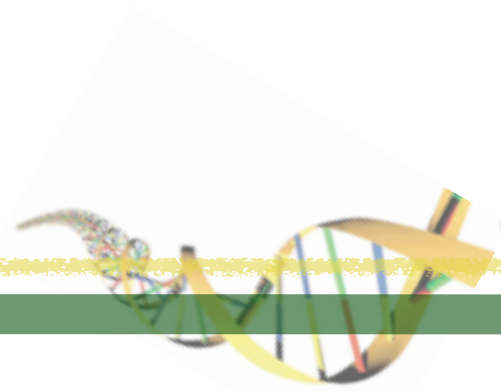
Grant distribution by type: Care & Treatment, Research

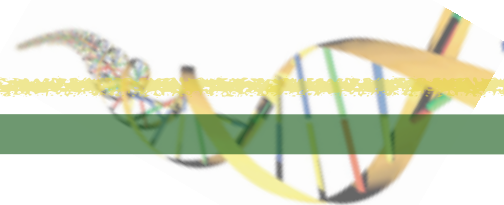

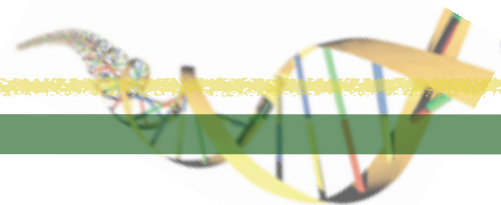

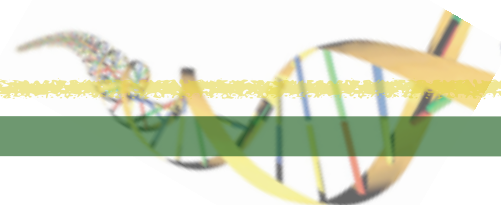
